





Capital Appearance—The Beatles performed for a youthful audience in Washington on the night of February 12.






Alaskan Quake—A whole line of cars rested about 20 feet below street level on a main thoroughfare in Anchorage the day following the disastrous earthquake on March 27.






Faculty
